the clear consensus in contemporary Bible scholarship is that stories of the virgin birth, miracles, the resurrection, the ascension and the second coming are mythological rather than historical.

Unfortunately many of these ministers hide this information from their congregations out of a misguided fear of losing membership, income or their jobs. As a result, Christianity in the USA is stuck in a pre-modern understanding of Jesus based on outdated and discredited methods of Bible study and interpretation.

In Unity, we believe that people can handle the truth. As Bishop John Shelby Spong once said; "If one's faith has to be protected from truth, it has already died." There is nothing wrong with Biblical mythology. In fact, developing a mythological perspective opens new doors to greater understanding of the true significance of the life and teachings of Jesus. Take away the flashy stuff and what is left? More than most people realize. In fact, it adds to rather than takes away from the meaning of the stories.

What was it about him that caused people to mythologize aspects of his life? Why did they choose to preserve certain historical mythical images and stories over others? For several hundred years, early Christians understood the mythological intent. The archetypes and images were drawn from their own historical context and most people knew they were not meant to be taken literally.

As more time passed and the stories traveled farther away from their cultural roots, the myths became literal, historical events. Unity has always been a part of reversing that trend and re-mythologizing the Bible. Easter is an opportunity to find the meaning and power in these stories without requiring a literal belief in a physical resurrection. That is a choice that we are empowered to make.

Many Jewish people have a hard time understanding why Christmas is such a big deal compared to Easter in America. I know this because my Uncle Dave brought up the topic during a Christmas pre-dinner conversation at my parents house many years ago. He was an uncle by marriage, a doctor by profession, a Sephardic Jew by birth (but not overtly religious) and an astute observer of human nature.

He noted that Easter seemed to be the defining event in Christianity but Christmas got all of the hype which he found puzzling in our Christian dominated culture. I remember thinking that he was absolutely correct and I figured that it all had to do with money. It was easy to use Christmas to feed the American economic machine. Easter could also be exploited but not as effectively or extensively as the cash cow that Christmas had become.

And yet, without the events in the Easter stories, there would be no Christianity as we know it today. The idea of a dying and rising God who would come back to rescue the believers was the driving force behind the spread of Christianity as a world religion. If there was no resurrection, then there would be no Christianity. Instead, the story would have ended after the Romans executed Jesus. He was buried and then he disappeared; story over, nothing to see here.

At the time of that conversation, I was still a nominal Christian but had long ago given up belief in the supernatural elements of both the Christmas and Easter stories which led me to question whether that rendered the life and teachings of Jesus meaningless. Take away the flashy supernatural stuff and what was left?

Reacting or Responding: The Choice is Yours



So often in the past, I have mentally "kicked myself" after reacting in fear or anger to what someone said to me that I experienced as hurtful or painful. I would let my ego speak for me rather than give myself time to feel and work through my emotions before

expressing myself. I allowed my ego to control me and gave away my power in those moments. I knew I had to find a better way to handle difficult discussions with others or comments that I found emotionally charged. I realized that by reacting immediately to the situation made it all the more challenging and ultimately more hurtful, especially since I knew that I was taking the person's words personally. I was not allowing my true self to emerge and did not give

myself the time I needed to access my Divine wisdom, compassion, and love.

I recently read a wonderful essay in Unity Worldwide Ministry's publication, "Fasting and Feasting 2020", entitled, "I feast on Responding Thoughtfully." In it, writer Rev. Karen Shepherd states, "I can respond thoughtfully by first becoming quiet and slowing my breath. Breath is the gateway to meditation and prayer. I can slow down and breathe even if engaged in a physical activity such as driving. Slowing the breath does not distract me; instead, it can increase awareness."

I can personally attest to how helpful the act of breathing is when experiencing pain or hurt as a consequence of another person's words and before letting myself speak. I have developed a practice of saying silently to myself, "One, two, three . . . respond" while focusing on my breath when hearing words that made me wince. This prayer has enabled me to step back from the situation enough to let my compassion and Divine Wisdom surface and my heart open. I always seem to find the right words to express my true self when responding rather than reacting. And oftentimes, I use silence as my response. I find that silence can give the other person the gift of awareness; i.e., they can hear how they sound.

Responding rather than reacting is a gateway to empowerment. It is a choice we can commit to that can change our relationships and our lives.
